Button holes: evenly spaced, neat, durable and suitable for garment type.

Necklines: including armhole finish. Seam allowance trimmed to 6mm. Overlocking and binding where necessary -fullness evenly distributed, grain correct. Neatness of neck and armholes. Finish of sleeves and hems, buttoning to correct side. Degree of difficulty will be taken into account when being judged.
